

Follow the Scientific Method listed below for this recipe or experiment and record them (on a document or paper): Make an observation. Make a comment or remark about what you have observed (time, materials, etc) Ask a question. This question should be related to what you just observed. Form a hypothesis. A hypothesis is a proposed explanation for why something happens. The format for a hypothesis is "If (happens), then (happens)." EX: "If I add sugar to hot tea, then it will dissolve faster than if added to cold tea." Test the prediction. Actually perform making the recipe or conducting the experiment. Draw a conclusion. Record the results of what happened. Think about if the experiment or recipe turned out the way you thought it would.

This can be ANY LEGAL business ☺ Then decide whether your small business would be considered "essential" or "non-essential" (ex. Essential—Restaurant, General/Convenient Store, Feed Store, Auto-Repair Shop or Non-Essential: Clothing Stores, Hobby Stores, Hand-Crafted Goods/Items, Screen Printing Business) and EXPLAIN WHY. Will your Small Business have a physical location? Can your physical location remain fully open, partially open with restrictions, or do you have to completely close? Does your business require other employees besides yourself? If so, will your employees still be able to work during the pandemic or what changes will you need to make in order for your employees to continue working during the pandemic? (Ex. Cut Hours, Extended Hours, Job duty modifications, etc.) Do you foresee any problems maintaining stock/inventory/supplies for your small business during the pandemic and explain why or why not? How will you continue communicating with your customers during the pandemic? What changes might you need to make to your current communication/marketing plan in order to reach them while also trying to reach potential NEW customers? How will you have to change your customer delivery system? (Ex. Curb-Side Pick-up, Home Delivery) How will operating your small business during the pandemic effect your personal life? (Ex. Time spent w/family & friends or doing things you enjoy) Has the pandemic offered your small business opportunities to expand your offerings in a positive way? (Ex. Restaurants starting to offer online ordering and curb-side pickup/home delivery) Do you think your small business will be able to survive during the duration of the pandemic? Explain why or why not?






